ington. It is 25 years since he assumed leadership of the Washington Hebrew Congre-

sideration. I don't know whether I can go or not. I have a very high regard for
Dr. Simon. I think he served here on the School Committee and is regarded as a very
useful citizen.

I was naturally pleased that the peace treaty was ratified. As I said at
the last conference, the indications were that it would be ratified all right, and
I think the importance of the treaty will grow among the people as it goes into op-
eration. 12 or 15 nations have already adhered to it. I think ours was the first
nation of those which signed it which has ratified it.
